Full Steam Ahead

Well we are not quite at full steam ahead but we are moving forward. We had to shut down operations in March back on St. Patrick's Day. We have been working diligently to safely reopen in baby steps since then. For those of you who have not been around the post and are staying to be safe, good for you. Most of us are vulnerable and need to be careful.

Under Commander Mark Clark I was asked to be the Covid-19 coordinator for Post 21 with Jackson County. Registering for this position has given me a direct link to the county with the most recent and updated information. I will continue that role as I assume the duties of Commander. Currently we have a mask mandate in place, social distancing of 6', 50% capacity allowed and no more than 100 people in a group. Our goal is to provide the safest environment possible during these difficult times. We are currently running Bingo on Monday and Tuesday evenings. Temperatures are taken when they enter our building and masks are required. We have the hall setup to make it easy for social distancing. We also have Club 21 (Lounge) open on those evenings starting at 3pm. Again, masks are mandated. Of course, you can remove your mask while eating and drinking but anytime you get up to go to the bar, order food, etc. you need to have your mask on. We have live entertainment on Friday and Saturday evenings with the same restrictions in place. Unfortunately, the situation is very fluid and can change at any time. As of writing this article the Covid-19 numbers in Missouri are rising. We will abide by whatever guidelines the County puts on us. Stay tuned on our Facebook page for the most recent information.

Thank you for the honor of being your Commander. Over the years my wife Betty and I have made our post a big part of our life. We love being there and interacting with all of you. Make sure to come up and introduce yourself to me if I have not met you. I am at the post frequently even during our current restricted hours. (The post is closed Wednesday, Thursday, and Sunday except for meetings scheduled on those days.) I have an open-door policy. Talk to me about anything that is on your mind. If you don't catch me in person you can email me at commanderpost21@gmail.com.

In his final article last month Commander Mark Clark asked for your patience. We will be back Full Steam as soon as we safely can. In the meantime if you have not done so please consider renewing your dues for 2021. We have extended the "Earlybird" deadline through October this year due to the pandemic. Why do Americans stand for the U.S. flag and the national anthem? In the midst of the NFL controversy over players who take a knee instead of standing for the national anthem, let us remember the many reasons why many of us stand for the flag and how it all began.

Americans have stood for the U.S. flag since June 14, 1777, the day the Continental Congress declared "that the flag of the (thirteen) United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white: that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation." Thirty-seven years later in Aug. 1814, the White House and U.S. Capitol lay in ashes after the British military burned the public buildings in Washington D.C. In the immediate aftermath, many

Americans understandably feared that the Union Jack, the British flag, would soon fly over all of America again. Hence, three weeks after the sacking of Washington, Francis Scott Key, a Maryland attorney who politically oppose the current president, was so moved at seeing the U.S. flag flying victoriously at the end of the battle for Baltimore's Fort McHenry,

that he wrote lyrics for The Star-Spangled Banner, the song we now call the national anthem.

1. We stand for the flag today, not to please ourselves but to honor those who paid the ultimate sacrifice for our freedom.

The more than 1.2 million Americans who have died because of war. We stand for soldiers who initially inspired our national anthem, such as William Williams, a runaway slave who later died after having his leg blown off as part of the 38th U.S. Infantry at the Battle of Fort McHenry. We also stand for more recent heroes, such as Robert Kelly, the son of White House Chief of Staff John Kelly, a marine lieutenant who died in a roadside bomb blast in Afghanistan in 2010.

"I believe every American, when the national anthem is played, should cover their hearts and think about all the men and women who have been maimed and killed. Every American should stand and think for three lousy minutes," John Kelly declared in response to the NFL controversy.

2. We stand for the flag not to focus on what divides us but on what unites us, which is being an American.

"The name of American, which belongs to you, in your national capacity, must always exalt the just pride of patriotism, more than any appellation derived from local discriminations. With slight shades of difference, you have the same religion, manners, habits, and political principles," George Washington, our first president, declared in his farewell address in 1796.

The same is true today. More than being a New Yorker or a Texan or being a Steelers fan or Rams fan, the name "American" deserves our highest respect and pride. Standing for the flag and anthem at a sports game or other public gatherings, symbolically shows that we are all Americans, no matter our race or religion, no matter our preferred sports team, and no matter our political differences. Standing is the ultimate salute to sportsmanship.

Wearing a mask in public is annoying enough — but an irritating side effect makes the practice even worse for those who wear eyeglasses or sunglasses. As anyone who dons spectacles quickly realizes, wearing a mask can cause your lenses to fog. Every time you breathe, the warm air you exhale travels into the mask, then up and over your lenses. Because the lenses are cooler, fog forms. Fortunately, the following fixes can prevent this annoyance.

1. Soap and water

A 2011 study published in the journal Annals of the Royal College of Surgeons of England found that a little soap and water goes a long way toward eliminating unwanted fogging. According to the study authors: "Immediately before wearing a face mask, wash the spectacles with soapy water and shake off the excess. Then, let the spectacles air dry or gently dry off the lenses with a soft tissue before putting them back on. Now the spectacle lenses should not mist up when the face mask is worn." One caveat: Although dish soap typically is recommended for this technique, it's important to choose a brand that does not use lotion, which can harm the lenses. Lukewarm water also is recommended, as hot water can damage lenses too.

2. Anti-fog spray

Sprays also are available to keep your lenses mist-free. You can find anti-fog sprays at Amazon. Just note that these can cause irritation of the eyes in some people, so they may not work for everyone.

3. Tuck a small tissue into the mask

Newsweek says attaching a small tissue to the inside of the mask will absorb moisture that otherwise would find its way to the lenses. The publication recommends placing a folded tissue at the top of your mask and taping it there. The tissue should absorb some of the air making it less likely for your glasses to get foggy.

4. Slide your glasses further down your nose

By sliding your spectacles a little lower down your nose, you can keep them out of the way of the moist air escaping from the top of the mask. This is probably not an ideal long-term solution, but it works in a pinch.

5. Fold down your face mask

For masks without flexible metal noses, one method to try is folding down the top quarter of the face mask to allow more room for the air to escape before it meets your glasses. However, be aware that folding down the mask reduces the area of your face that is covered.

6. Modify the mask to better fit your face

Finally, Glamour says a mask that fits your face more snugly is less likely to produce fogging. So, if the mask has a wire inside the top edge, pinch it to your nose. If your mask doesn't have a wire, Glamour recommends a tutorial that can help you create a mask with a "flexible nose."


Note: Remember, do not touch the mask while wearing it. If you do touch the mask clean your hands.



3. We stand for the flag not to pledge allegiance to a president, but to honor the reality that we have an elected president and not a lifetime king.

By standing, we honor the fact that our country has had 45 presidents. Our flag reflects our system of government, divided by 50 states, the stars on the flag, but united under a federal government. The national anthem controversy in the NFL started during the term of our previous president and continues during our current president's term.

4. We stand not because of past or present pain caused by injustice, but to salute the principle of justice.

This is one of the three definitions for the color blue that Congress gave us in 1782. "The colors of . . . those used in the flag of the United States of America. White signifies purity and innocence. Red (signifies) hardiness and valor and blue . . . signifies vigilance, perseverance and justice." Patriotism is not pride in the pain of our nation's past. Rather, patriotism is pride in the principles that paved the way for change, whether that change was trading royalty for representation in 1776 or exchanging enslavement for emancipation in 1863.

From John Adams and Thomas Jefferson to Martin Luther King, Jr., many Americans have stood for justice for a more perfect union. "When the architects of our republic wrote the magnificent words of the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence, they were signing a promissory note to which every American was to fall heir. This note was a promise that all men—yes, black men as well as white men—would be guaranteed the unalienable rights of life,
